DAT Students in Action: Implementing Biosecurity Measures in Swine Production Area

This hands-on activity served a dual purpose. Primarily, it aimed to equip students with the skills necessary to acquire and apply standard biosecurity farm practices. Biosecurity is a crucial aspect of animal husbandry, as it helps to minimize the risk of disease introduction and spread within a livestock population. By following proper cleaning and disinfection procedures, students learned how to create an optimal environment for the impending arrival of a new batch of swine.

In preparation for this activity, Mr. Gania had previously utilized slideshow presentations to instruct the DAT-22-A students on the proper cleaning and disinfection techniques for grower pens. These techniques adhere to the standards present by TESDA (Technical Education and Skills Development Authority). This practical exercise not only reinforced classroom learning but also served as valuable preparation for the students' upcoming Assessment in Animal Production (Swine) NC II.

Through this application of biosecurity protocols, the DAT 22-A class gained valuable experience that will serve them well in their future agricultural careers. They learned the importance of maintaining a clean and disinfected environment for livestock, a skill that will contribute to the health and well-being of animals under their care.

Concepcion Vocational School (CVS), in collaboration with the Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP-Concepcion), led a seminar on Fire Safety Drill in observance of Fire Prevention Month, held on Friday, March 22, 2024, at the TRC Compound, Brgy. Alfonso, Concepcion, Tarlac.

Administrative Officer IV Ma'am Ma. Restituta L. Paras served as the introducer, and Engr. Bryan Jake B. Castro led the prayer, with officers from the Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP-Concepcion) acting as instructors and speakers to impart the importance of Fire Safety Drills and the significance of observing Fire Prevention Month in March.

Fire Officer 1 Sir Rico Reyes led the BFP contingent, discussing the Vision and Mission of the BFP. He shared the history of significant fires in the Philippines, such as the Ozone Disco Fire, explaining its origin and the reasons behind the high casualty count.

He also discussed the Kentex Factory Fire, explaining its cause and origin, and taught about different types of fires, three methods of fire spread, proper use of fire extinguishers, various types of fire extinguishers, and the correct use of gas or LPG tanks.



Following him, Fire Officer 1 Ma'am Annalyn Aplision emphasized the importance of understanding the "Triangle Tetrahedron," consisting of heat, fuel, and oxygen, which are essential for creating and sustaining fire.

After the BFP officers shared their knowledge, a fire drill was conducted, where students from various qualifications successfully demonstrated proper evacuation procedures during a fire, gathering in the CVS quadrangle along with administrative staff and faculty.



Before concluding the seminar, the BFP conducted an actual demonstration on extinguishing fires. DAT 22-A prepared an example for the demonstration, and representatives from each qualification were given a chance to use the fire extinguisher.

Among those who tried extinguishing the fire was Dr. Lerma P. Llorente, Assistant Professor IV. During the seminar, attendees were reminded, "Do not panic; remember the three steps if you're on fire: Stop, Drop, and Roll."



The seminar concluded with BFP expressing gratitude to CVS for their cooperation, and CVS reciprocated by thanking BFP for their meaningful contribution to fire prevention education. In an interview with one of the fire officers, Sir Carlo said, "It is better to be robbed than to be burned."

Vocational School Administrator Dr. Consolacion A. Talisik emphasizes the significance of this initiative, underlining the school's unwavering commitment to creating a safe and peaceful environment for everyone.

The administrative staff, instructors, and students collectively demonstrated responsibility towards safety. Concepcion Vocational School showcased its preparedness for potential hazards.

The Ozone Disco Fire occurred on March 18, 1996, in Quezon City, claiming 162 lives, and is considered the worst fire in Philippine history and the fifth worst nightclub fire globally.

The Kentex Factory Fire happened on May 13, 2015, in Valenzuela City, Manila, resulting in the deaths of 72 workers.
